THE NEED

Community colleges across the country have been historically underfunded and we need support from our community to close the gap between the College's operating budget and students' actual financial need. RCC relies on individual donations, foundation grants, and corporate sponsorship to ensure our students get the support they need to achieve academic and career success.

STUDENT SCHOLARSHIPS

Public dollars only meet a fraction of the total financial aid need each semester. Private donations are critical to ensuring tuition and fees are not a barrier for students to enroll and persist at RCC.

- Merit-Based Scholarships are awarded to applicants with a 2.5 GPA or higher and a faculty recommendation. (Credit students only)
- Need-Based Scholarships are awarded to applicants with a demonstrated financialneed. (Credit and non-credit students)
- Retention and Completion Grants are designed to assist students who are close to completion and in danger of dropping out due to unpaid tuition and/or fees. (Credit and non-credit students)



STUDENT SUPPORT SERVICES

RCC students face a myriad of financial and social challenges. Non-tuition barriers like food insecurity, mental health, childcare, and housing insecurity can be the biggest obstacles to success.

- Project Access helps students get the things they need like health insurance, food, transportation, help with bills, legal advice, mental health and domestic violence support, childcare that is affordable and furniture or clothes.
- The Wellness Center provides education, outreach and support services for students in need of mental health support.
- The Rox Box Food Pantry is continually stocked with both perishable and nonperishable items as well as personal care products. (Open to all students)


RCC CLASS OF 2023

- 157 graduates receiving associate degrees or credit certifications
- Approximately 68% of RCC graduates reside in Boston; 17% reside in Dorchester, 9% in Hyde Park, and 7% in Roxbury.
- 33% of graduates received degrees in healthcare; 21% of graduates are received degrees in STEM fields
- The Class of 2023 includes the first 9 graduates from RCC's new nursing program, which was launched in September 2021.
